THE CEASING OF EXQUISITE MUSIC

"The memory of Josias is like the composition of a sweet smell made by the art of a perfumer: his remembrance shall be sweet as honey in every mouth, and as music at a banquet of wine."

Ecclesiasticus 49:1, 2.

There is a line in Longfellow's "Evangeline" which pictures vividly the effect holiness and purity of life have upon others, even passing bystanders. Of a Saturday afternoon, Evangeline is coming home from Confession. Down the road she walks, passing now this group, now that. Not a word is spoken: she merely passes by. But all know her for the pure, thoroughly good young woman that she is; and Longfellow sums up her journey home in a line unexcelled in literature: "When she passed it seemed like the ceasing of exquisite music."

What a bit of i magery! We know how exquisite music affects us. It lifts us up out of our commonplace world, high, high above into the realms of clearer vision and purer ideals, and when it has ceased we drift back slowly to earth, but so changed, so refreshed, so tingling with purified emotion.

That is what Longfellow meant to tell us of Evangeline, and that is what the Sacred Writer thousands of years ago meant to tell us of the holy king Josias: "The memory of Josias is like the composition of a sweet smell made by the art of the perfumer: his remembrance shall be sweet as honey in every mouth, and as music at a banquet of wine,"

That is the effect my life should have on all I meet, at home or abroad, at work or at play. Yet is it? When I leave the folks at home for a short spell or for long while or for just the daily comings and goings, does it seem to each of my loved ones "like the ceasing of exquisite music"? Or do they rather heave a sigh of relief that I am gone? When I leave the ship, am I really missed and do I leave a void? Or again does a knowing glance go the rounds that indicates a sense of security that an irritant has been removed?

New XO For ANTIETAM Commander H. L. SALYER

"The thing that impressed me the most about the ship as I ceported aboard was its cleanliness."

Commander Herbert L. Salyer was born in Bend, Gregon. He graduated from Modesto Junior College in Modesto, California, and attended the University of California where he studied engineering. CDR Salyer entered the Naval Aviation Cadet program in late 1940 and was awarded his commission and "Navy Wings of Gold" at Pensacola, Florida, in August, 1941.

Following short tours as a flight instructor at Pensacola, Florida, ind Corpus Christi, Texas, and as a stud-

instructor at Pensacola, Floride, and Corpus Christi, Texas, and as a student in Photo School at Pensacola, CDR Salyer reported to Fleet Air Wing 14 in San Diego. After two months of transition training in FAW-14, he joined Photographic Squadron One in October 1942 where he remained until June 1944 when he was transferred to Photographic Squadron Five for a year of duty. During these latter two tours, CDR Salyer participated in the Solomon Islands, Marianas and Philippine Campaign in the Western Pacific area.

As World War II came to a close, CDR Selyer was Officer-in-Charge of a Training Squadron at Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, Florida. During the next two years, November, 1945, to June, 1948, he served in the Bureau of Aeronautics in the Armament Division. During eight months of this period he was temporairly sasigned to the Navy's Anterotic Expedition, Operation Hi-Jump on Admiral Byrd's Staff.

After a tour on the Staff of Commander Airforce Facific Fleet, CDR Salyer attended General Line and Combat Information Center Schools. A year on the USS VALLEY FORGE(CVA-45) in Operations and a year as Commanding Officer of Photographic Squadron follower followed by snother tour in Washington, D.C., in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, working with support aircraft and serial terret systems.

CDR Salver became Executive Officer of the USS ANTIETAM in February, 1959, after four months as Executive Officer and 19 months as Commanding Officer of Heavy Attack Squadron Two, the first A3D Squadron assigned to

Officer of the first A3D Squeoron the U.S. Pacific Fleet.
For services in the Pacific Campaigns, CDR Salver was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal, a Personal Letter of Commendation and a Naval Unit Commendation as well as several area campaign rib-

bons and sters.


